

Sarah's Guest House

Sarah's Guest House, on Robert Avenue in Syracuse, NY, provides lodging, transportation, meals and comfort to patients and families of patients receiving medical care. The inspiration came from a young man, Billy, who was diagnosed with Acute Leukemia in his twenties. When he traveled out of state to receive complex care, his family was able to stay at hospitality houses serving patients and families. His wish was to establish a warm and caring place for families who traveled to Syracuse for medical treatment.

Over the last 25 years this hospitality house has grown because of the work of many volunteers. After a long and complex battle this young man died from complications of his illness. But his wish to give back to his community did not fade. His loving aunt and many volunteers established and staffed a residence for families in need. Sarah's Guest House has served hundreds of families and has become a thriving hospitality house. The staff is small but the committed and loving volunteers have worked to create a warm and inviting place.

In September I received a phone call from the fundraiser and event planer for Sarah's Guest House, Renee. She had been given my contact information by a mutual acquaitance who knew I made quilts. This was to be the 25th anniversary of the Guest House and they wanted to recognize the founder, Mary, the loving aunt, who loved quilts. There are many quilts throughout Sarah's Guest House adding a feeling of welcome and an atmosphere of home. They also wanted to have a quilt made as a fundraiser.

Renee had no idea who I was or if I could help in her endeavors to recognize the commitment of Aunt Mary, to mark the 25 years of service, and to raise funds to improve facilities at the Guest House. She reached out and asked if I knew how she could get this accomplished. Little did she know that in my previous life I was a Nurse Practitioner and had cared for Billy.

This is how my journey to create "Welcome In" began. It may actually have started 25 years ago but life sometimes comes full circle. The quilt will hang at Sarah's Guest House.

Save Your Scraps

Keep the rescued pets comfortable - first of all I would like to thank all of you who have given me and Kathy Lee your leftover quilting scraps. They have been repurposed into pet beds for local pet rescue groups. The groups have been appreciative for the beds that provide some comfort to the cats and dogs. Batting, fabric, even t-shirt parts are useful. I use larger pieces for the outside and then stuff the smaller stuff inside. There is no need to chop the material into small pieces. All types of leftover fabrics can be used (think polyester, corduroy, linen, etc.).
