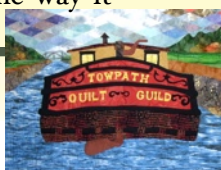
She grew up in Minnesota but has not lived there for forty years, so family—whether here or there—is the most important part of her life. She treasures those connections, knowing these are people she can count on.

She was unable to come up with a particular embarrassing moment stating that when you have siblings or kids, there are too many to choose from.

Barb said that accounting was her favorite course in high school and that led to her first career. Many friends and high school activities remain in her memories, but once she took an accounting class, she was "hooked".

Her bucket list includes traveling with her husband and dog. She stated that she can't go anywhere with her husband unless the dog is included! Also, she looks forward to going to Norway to visit relatives she has never met, buying a long-arm quilting machine (which means adding onto the house, and which in turn means she will probably never attain that one!) We hope that her dream will come true, home addition and all!





## CAROL HOLLADAY

Carol taught French and Spanish, her dream job since she was 8. She took a year off to have a second child, and unable to find a job within commuting distance, went to school to become a school psychologist. In high school, Carol like math and science and might have gone into computer technology if she had realized how it would change the world.

She began to take classical violin lessons, beginning in fourth grade but stopping while in college. Last fall, she transformed this interest into taking fiddle lessons, learning some of the same pieces her great-great uncles played when her mother was small. These uncles were taught by their father, who named them all after Civil War Confederate generals.

Carol has been sewing and crafting many years. At age 7, her grandmother taught her to knit using pencils. As her father watched, he wanted to learn and made half a dozen sweaters. Carol's start in quilting was rocky as she chose a scrappy pineapple pattern with little knowledge about color, value, construction, bias edges, rulers or squaring up. That first quilt ended up as a baby, rather than a bed, quilt. Her second quilt was a double Irish chain for her daughter but again, she had problems. After time passed, she recognized the problem and finished the twin-sized quilt. She sent it to be hand quilted; when it came back a year later, Carol did not think it had enough quilting. Her daughter's response was that she now had a queen-sized bed. So Carol added more borders and quilting.

In 1995 Carol approached the other women in the school where she worked to see if they were interested in making a wall hanging quilt for two who were retiring. That idea developed into a 20-year activity of making quilts for events in the lives of those at the school, resulting in about 100 quilts, none of which used the same pattern.

Carol spent the year she was 15 traveling in Europe where her dad was teaching. They logged 20,000 miles visiting historical sites and museums. This heightened her interest in foreign languages and increased her tolerance of diversity.



Carol's retirement trip, suggested by her daughter, was a trip to Peru. Her bucket trip includes more travel and making an original art quilt and a landscape. Carol has an interesting story about an embarrassing moment the first time she wore nylons - ask her to tell you.



## Leah Robinson



When asked how she spends her free time, Leah Robinson replied that since she is retired all of her time feels like free time! That free time is filled with quilting, of course, reading, playing bridge, and volunteering at her church.

A memorable trip which Leah took was a cruise on the Mediterranean that included visits to Rome, Sicily, Malta, Santorini, Mykonos, and Athens. This was her first and so far only cruise.

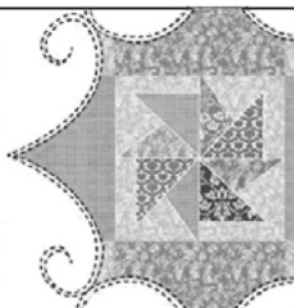

The need is for quilts and fleece blankets, size TWIN XL, which is the width of a standard twin, but 5" longer. The fleece should be serged or hemmed, not tied, for ease in bed making.

This is an excellent opportunity to use your browns, greens, and burgundies, but don't forget some bright colors to cheer the rooms for these formerly homeless gentlemen!

The January meeting will be a work day for this project.
