Tip for cleaning your machine: if you are in the habit of cleaning around the bobbin case when you put in a new bobbin, be sure you put a little drop of oil on the hook in the bobbin area. What I just discovered is that it is also a great idea to remove the needle plate (you know the part that is over the feed dogs) and clean out the lint and gunk from there also. My needle plate kept popping off when I was sewing through multiple layers and I was about to take it to a shop to get serviced. Well, I removed the plate and was I surprised to see how much lint had been packed into the feed dogs under the plate. It was a wonder that the machine could even sew! Do NOT use compressed air as that will just blow the lint farther into the machine. Use a small nylon brush to get into the tiny space. If you show your machine a little love, it will love you back!

Service Project Update

Marilouise and I would like to send out a huge thank you to all that donated materials, made quilts on your own or came to sew. We are well on our way to making over 60 quilts for the YMCA in downtown. Over 30 members came to the January Service Project day in January and we were able to assemble 15 quilts. Mary from the YMCA came and was very impressed with all of our hard work and teamwork. Well, almost quilts. We are in the process of adding side panels to make them into the width needed, but that is not very hard. Then on to the binding! Over 25 members have signed up to make a quilt on their own with batting provided by the Guild. Some folks wanted instructions on how to add the side panels, so here it is:

First trim off excess fabric all the way around. Measure the width of the quilted panel, probably around 40 inches. Subtract from 63, round up and divide by 2, then add 1 inch.

Example:63 - 40 = 23 rounded to 24, divide by 2 = 12, add I = 13 (I usually do 14 inches)

Prepare 2 pieces of fabric that coordinate with the back to measure 13 x 94.

Prepare 2 pieces of batting that measures 14 x 94, if you use scraps, be sure to connect them in some way so they will not shift.

Prepare 2 strips of white or cream fabric for the front, 2 1/2 x 94.

Prepare 2 strips of fabric that coordinates with front of quilt, 11 x 94.

Pin the back strip to back, right sides together, helps keep the edges stable. Pin the narrow strip to front, right sides together, using same pins. Sew the 2 strips onto quilt. Can be done in one step.

Iron both strips outward, be sure they are straight and tight. Here comes the tricky part, best done on a long, flat surface. Fold back the narrow strip on the front and lay the batting strip tight against the seam you just sewed, do not overlap. Pin the batting to the backing about 4 inches away from the seam. Leave these pins in for now.

Flip the narrow strip back over the batting, smooth it out. Lay the next front strip onto the strip, right sides together. Be sure everything stays smooth. Sew the strip on. This will anchor the batting.

Flip this strip out and remove those extra pins. Iron and smooth everything again. Place a row of pins onto the new strip about 5 inches from the newest seam. Using whatever method you choose, straight line quilt 2-4 inches apart down this strip.

Repeat on other side.

One desire Gaynell Dorrance, Berta Keeler, Jeannine Lloyd and Nancy Sellers had was to go on a quilt retreat together. In October 2018, we traveled together (in one minivan) to Bloom Quilts in Margaretville, NY, on the edge of the Catskill Mountains.

Bloom is a cute fabric store and small retreat center that looked just perfect for our 2-night adventure. Well, turns out, it was beyond perfect, and we had such a great time that we went back again in October 2019, but this time for 4 nights! A quilt retreat can be whatever the participants want it to be. Bringing sewing projects is obvious, but there is so much more. History of the Towpath Quilt Guild

As our guild moves closer to its 40th anniversary let's spend some time learning about the beginnings of the guild. Here is an excerpt from our historian files: "The Towpath Quilt Guild was born in the spring of 1981, developing from an informal quilt show at the Fayetteville Public Library. The Founding Mothers- Marty Bowne, Lee Burnham, Donna Fuller, Jean Hughes, and Phyllis Scutt, worked diligently following that show to create the Guild. The first meeting, March 1981, held at Fayetteville's Merchant Bank, had an attendance of thirty quilters. Attendance of the April meeting doubled to sixty! The bank no longer was able to accommodate the numbers attending and the meetings were moved to the United Methodist Church. What a growth spurt, within six months the membership blossomed from a mere thirty to over 100 members!

Right from its birth, the Guild has been industrious in its endeavors. May of 1981, two months after the first formal meeting, the Guild invited Michael James to speak at a public program. Response from the community was over-whelming, attendance was excellent, and as a result the Guild's treasury was firmly established.

The informal quilt shows in public libraries continued for 2 more years. In 1985 the first formal two day Quilt Show occurred. Now these shows are scheduled every other year, in the spring."

Annual dues in these early days was \$10. "Beverages and refreshments are not served at the Guild meetings. Coffee and tea stains are difficult to remove from the precious quilts and quilting during the meetings is never discouraged. Members are however, invited to bring lunches for after the meetings and stay for the afternoon to work in informal groups."

"Small groups are also formed for Friendship quilts. Each member of the group assembles the fabrics for her quilt in a large box, along with plans and instructions. Boxes are passes, at the Guild meetings, from one group member to another. Each group member makes one block a month from the box she receives, simultaneously someone else is doing a block for her. With 18 persons in a group, 18 blocks are made over the course of 18 months for each group member. At the end of 18 months the blocks are laid out and planning for settings and quilting designs are discussed for each quilt."

August: Michael James, Quiltmaker Inspirations and Innovations in Contemporary Quiltmaking

September: Tis the Season to be Quilting: Christmas ideas for small gifts.

October: Quilted Fashion Show: Show and tell-Wear or bring any quilted clothing you have made...

November: History of Quilting

December: Gifts and Ornaments and Christmas party

January: Denim Patch Workshop

National Quilting Day

National Quilting Day is on Saturday, March 21st this year. Towpath Quilt Guild member are invited to participate in the WEE LITTLE QUILTS project to benefit the Quilt Consortium of New York State (QCNYS) scholarship fund.

Our guild has chosen this project because several Towpath members have received \$100 scholarships for educational classes from the NYSQC.

The Consortium was able to offer double the amount of scholarships for 2020 as they did in 2019, because of the increase of the number of 10" x 10" WEE LITTLE QUILTS donated in 2019. The WEE LITTLE QUILTS will be sold to the public for \$10 each at the QCNYS 2021 Best of New York Quilt Show.

WHAT IS A WEE LITTLE QUILT?

- I. Wee Little Quilts (aka small fiber art quilts) are 10 inches x 10 inches.
- 2. These quilts may be pieced, applique, thread work, painted, dyed, paper pieced, etc. any technique and any fiber medium.

They can have a finished edge without a binding.
